Summary of September 11, 2019 Coordinating Council Meeting

The meeting was called to order at 6:45 PM on Wednesday, September 11, 2019 by Tom Wiley. Present were Tom, Rolf, Brenda, Rev. Nancy, and Judy. Caryl Gilman and Sheila Bourque were also present. Tom offered the opening prayer, a reflection on 9/11. Rolf made a motion to accept the minutes of the August 15 meeting, seconded by Brenda, and passed. Sheila had joined the council to try and address questions in the quote for paving the driveway. Shamos Paving had been recommended by the Town of Raymond. She clarified with Shamos that it will cost about \$10,000, but there are still questions to be answered. It was agreed that Rolf will take over at this point, and will contact Shamos and try to get some issues clarified. Because the church does not own all of what is currently considered driveway, we can only pave to the property line.

Caryl Gilman joined the council to talk about a suggested change to our By Laws which she feels should come to the congregation at our annual meeting in January. Currently, a portion of Article XI reads "In the event the R.V.C.C. and the corporation should dissolve, the ownership of the physical property and real estate of the church shall pass to the Maine Conference of the United Church of Christ." Caryl has spoken to people at the conference office, they are not interested in having churches leave their property to them. Therefore, she feels it should read "In the event the R.V.C.C and the corporation should dissolve, the ownership of the physical property and real estate of the church shall pass to an organization legally considered a non-profit organization. In no instance shall any property, real or otherwise, pass to any private individual or individuals nor to any "for profit" organization. The council agreed this should be on the warrant for the annual meeting in January 2020.

Caryl also reported that the local Lions Club have offered to help improve the gardens at the front of the church. This sounded like a good idea to the council. Caryl will check with the Metz family, Bob Metz had had some of these plantings done in memory of his wife Gloria. Caryl also reported on recent **Mission** activity, the meal at Maine Seacoast Mission, and the items collected for Ronald McDonald House and Grace Street Ministry. Caryl and Rev. Nancy presented plans for a series of worship services in late September and October designed to facilitate discussion of where our church goes from here. One of the services would feature a speaker from a local church which has recently gone through this same process. Dates need to be clarified, but the council is in favor of the process.

Treasurer's Report: Concern was expressed that donations for siding project are not coming in as we had hoped. It was suggested that since people see the project happening, they may assume that we have the money to do it, this needs to be clarified. Brenda presented the August financial report. Contributions were \$5242.50 for the month in the general fund. Less than budget by \$251, but still ahead year to date by \$461. Fundraisers income was \$340 less than budget for the month, and \$1161 under budget for the year. Total income of \$6648 was under budget by \$601 for the month. After adjusting for the American Fund valuation increases, total income is \$4.52 less than budget for the year to date. Total expenses of \$8,544 were over budget by \$1,179 for the month. Most of this due to extra payroll period in August which had not been budgeted for. This will be made up later in the year. Total contributions for the month to PP&E were \$2,065, \$965 to Fran Mains' Memorial and \$1,100 to siding project. Total in Fran Mains account is now \$1,140, total in vinyl siding project is \$4,327, less than one quarter of our goal of \$20,000. Bottom line, if you exclude adjustment for stock increase, we are very close to budget for the year, which is a deficit. A motion was made by Tom, seconded by Rolf, and passed, to accept the Treasurer's Report subject to year end review.

Trustees: Rolf reported that a new router has solved some of the computer problems in the office. The computer which Lori uses now is 6 or 7 years old, and uses Windows 7. We need a new computer and need to update to Windows 10. Power Church will work with Windows 10. Rev. Nancy made a motion, seconded by Brenda, and approved, to spend up to \$600 for new computer and upgrade to Windows 10. Rolf will contact scouts about fall clean up, after siding is completed. There will be a lot of painting jobs to be done, windows, doors, etc. after the siding project is completed.

Missions: reported earlier

Christian Education: Rev. Nancy has not had enough people willing to help, so the Sunday School in a box program will not be happening.

Deacons: Have not met in a while. Tentative plan to meet on September 29.

Moderator: nothing more to report

Pastor: Rev. Nancy reported that about 30 people had attended the community luncheon in August. She has performed two weddings recently, and has been working with the Lum family for a memorial service for Marian, scheduled for 9/21. She and Patrick are working on special music. During Advent focus will be on "Joy to

Seacoast Mission – Downeast Table of Plenty – Marie Guerin, Caryl Gilman and Caryl's sister, Anne, as emissaries of RVCC, brought the food and cooked a turkey dinner for 65 in the Cherryfield community on Sunday September 8. At the last minute we learned there were a number of people who are vegetarian, so we cooked vegetarian chili too. Comments on the meal were: "This is the best meal we've had all year!" "Thanks for the vegetarian options!" "Thanks for driving so far to provide a delicious meal." "Yummy home baked goods!" What we learned is that RVCC provided a "real meal" when most other Sunday meals are casseroles and baked goods donated from Hannaford.

Caryl talked to Scott to ask the news of the Housing Rehab program. They are still working on 17-25 homes a season, however now the projects are more about weatherizing. The York Association arrived September 8 to replace 9 windows in houses and do other weatherizing. Their new project, providing tiny houses, is underway and the first one built in MA should arrive in Cherryfield this fall – check the news for the "parade" up Rt 95.

Getting ready for School Kits in the spring: Thank you to everyone who brought in 70 page spiral notebooks. We collected 45 which is enough for 15 school kits.

Our Vinyl Siding Project is in need of funding.

Why do we need to help fund this project?

At the beginning of the year, the balance of funds we had to use for Building Repair & Maintenance was \$40,916. The Vinyl Siding Project itself is projected to cost \$39,000, which essentially would have taken up the entire fund and left nothing for future maintenance or handicap accessibility projects. We were able to negotiate a financing arrangement so that we could move forward with this project as soon as the

contractor was ready and not have to wait for funds to be raised. We need to continue to seek additional funding in order to pay down the bank note and replenish our Building, Repair & Maintenance fund.
