What is Scout Sunday?

Scout Sunday is observed in many churches which charter scout units. Historically it has been held the Sunday before February 8, which is the anniversary date of founding of the Boys Scouts of America. The organization was incorporated on February 8th, 1910.

This year is the 110th anniversary of BSA.

Our church has been a sponsor of scouts for nearly 25 years.

We charter Pack 800 which is for youth ages 5 to $10^{1/2}$ years old. Now cub scouting is for boys and girls. We also charter Troop 800 which is a traditional boy's troop with scouts age $10^{1/2}$ to 18. And in February of 2019 we became one of the chartering organizations for Troop 851 which is a female scout unit, these groups are very busy in an around the community and within our church.

The recyclable shed, retaining wall and outdoor patio are among the Eagle projects which have been created by some of our scouts.

Although not active, we also hold the chartering rights to sponsor Crew 1675 which is for venture scouts aged 14 to 21 and is also a coed unit.

Many of our church members have been involved in scouting through the years, as parents, leaders, merit badge counselors, and even scouts themselves.

Congratulations on a 110-year commitment.

Summary of December 4, 2019 Coordinating Council Meeting

The meeting was called to order at 6:15 PM on Wednesday, December 4, 2019 by Tom Wiley. Present were Tom, Rolf, Brenda, Judy, Caryl Gilman and Nancy Yates.

Judy offered the opening prayer, a Christmas Version of 1 Corinthians 13.

Rolf made a motion, seconded by Brenda and passed to approve the minutes of the October 2 meeting.

Treasurer's Report: Brenda presented the Treasurer's Report for November. Current Contributions were \$5,188 for the month in the general fund, less than budget by \$255. Year to date contributions are \$118 lower than budget. Fund Raisers included income from our table at the Library Craft Fair, budget however had assumed a fair of our own. Rental from the Parsonage has increased from \$509 to \$719 per month. Two months rent was included in the November report. Total income of \$7,006 was under budget by \$342 for the month. After adjusting for the American Fund valuation increases, total income is only \$17 less than budget year to date. Pastoral ministry expense has varied from budget due to timing of quarterly payments. This expense is expected to be close to budget by the end of the year. Diaconate expense at \$525 was over budget by \$275. This account, combined with the expenses for Music Director, are right on budget for the year. Supply pastors expense of \$175, did not have a budget for the month, however, year to date this expense is under budget by \$175. Administrative costs were over budget by \$368, due to purchase of new computer. Part of this is offset by donation in previous month of \$200 toward computer. Trustees were over budget by \$249. Total expenses for the month are \$8,636, over budget by \$1721, but for the year to date, under budget by \$1.98. Brenda is predicting a loss of \$4,738 for the year versus our budgeted loss of \$21,472. This positive variance can be primarily attributed to the increase in American Funds of \$13,047

Brenda also reported that she feels we have seen the end of fundraising income for the siding project. Caryl suggested that we bring this matter up at the annual meeting. Even though we have a good interest loan for this project, people need to understand that we will be paying off a loan. Brenda also expressed that although our pledge campaign got off to a strong start this year, she is now seeing a decrease in some of the pledges recently received. It was suggested that we need to emphasize that we have a vision, and are moving forward. The vision could be on the cover on the

Annual Report, and it could also be in the letter mailed with first quarter pledge statements. Rolf made a motion, seconded by Tom, and passed to accept the Treasurer's Report subject to year end review.

Budget: Brenda presented the proposed budget for 2020. Pledges for 2020 are expected to come in slightly higher than this year, fundraising income will be down. Total income will be up slightly for the year. The proposed budget has a 2.8% cost of living increase in Pastoral Ministry. This is what was recommended by the UCC. Proposed deficit for 2020 currently stands at \$24,342, it could increase. At the rate we are going, we will run out of money in another two to three years. People at the annual meeting need to be aware of this. Will they just accept the deficit budget or will there be discussion of how to make our money last longer. Those present at the council meeting discussed various possibilities.

Designated Funds: Brenda and Caryl raised the issue of "current" vs. "endowed or invested funds". After a great deal of research, they both agree that there is \$24,654 in the first category which they would feel comfortable moving from Christian Education and Music into the General Fund. They both felt that this could be done with a council vote. Tom made a motion, seconded by Rolf and approved to move this \$24,654 into the General Fund. This would prolong our ability to operate for probably another year. There is another pool of funds totaling \$10,847.15 for which they found some evidence that donors may have wanted only the interest used. This was a number of years ago, however. They feel that these funds also should be moved into the General Fund, but that in this case it would require a vote of the governing body of the church (i.e. the congregation). This vote will take within the Treasurer's Report at the Annual Meeting, we will include the agenda in the annual report booklet, so people are aware that this vote will take place.

New Business: The agenda for the Annual Meeting was reviewed. The articles will be taken in numerical order. Under Article 2, "to adopt a budget" will be 2 additional items, the siding loan, and the issue of designated funds. Break for lunch will probably take place between Articles 3 and 4. It was suggested that lunch be similar to last year, with prepared bag lunch. Nancy Yates has agreed to become a Deacon. Rolf make a motion to appoint Nancy Yates as a Deacon, seconded by Tom and approved.

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Spiritual Affective Disorder: Epiphany Season Worship Series

At the turn of this new year, we will explore everyday life activities that can become spiritual practices—deepening our experience of a meaningful life and make us more "light-hearted."

"Arise! Shine! For your light has come!" (Isaiah 60:1)

As some of you know, we began this worship series in early January on Epiphany Sunday. It will continues through February to the beginning of Lent. Here's what you can look forward to:

February 2nd – Lighten Up!

Life can be serious business. Certainly watching the daily news can give the impression that there is little good to find in the world. This week we will choose to lighten up as we look for the delight and especially, humor, in life. Perhaps laughter *is* the best medicine!

February 9th – Make My Day

Rather than see doing good as "obligatory sacrifice," the prophet Micah said that when we live our lives with a love for kindness for all God's people, we are fulfilling God's desire to spread justice and love. What if we lived each day on the lookout for ways to make someone's day through a kind and unexpected gesture? It might just make *our* day as well!

February 16th – Walk this Way

Research shows that one of the most effective mood-boosters is moving our bodies. Stretching, walking and dancing can send feel-good endorphins coursing through us and the change can feel like a light coming on. Old Testament authors used the metaphor of "walking" in God's ways to help us see the benefits to our spiritual lives of moving toward the goodness of God. This week our spiritual practice of movement will remind us that we are a blessed gift of God's love in action in the world!

February 23rd - Leave Room for Dessert

The server at your favorite restaurant might regularly say to you, "leave room for dessert!" In other words, don't eat to excess—leave some room. This is a good spiritual practice that goes all the way back to the ancient Israelites. The book of Leviticus advocates gleaning, which is the practice of gathering food for those who need it out of the abundance of what is available.

The question we will explore this week is: What awareness can we bring to the food we buy, cook and throw away as part of our spiritual mandate to care for the human family? Whether it is cooking more than enough and sharing with someone who needs it, buying extra at the grocery store to donate to the food bank, or getting involved in a gleaning network's efforts, our everyday use of food is our spiritual practice this week.

Get Ready for Lent!

Patrick and Rev. Nancy are so excited about what is coming up in worship during Lent! With the help of our choir and several additional vocalists and instrumentalists, our worship will focus on the well-loved musical "Godspell". Each week we will focus on two songs and the scenes that accompany them – with narrative to place those songs/scenes/parables into the context of Jesus' life and ministry. Council Minutes, continued . . .

Trustees: Rolf reported the repair of chimney to stop a leak into the furnace room will take place on January 4. Missions: Caryl Gilman reported that the local Fuller Center application to be approved as a Fuller Center covenant partnership has been accepted by the national organization. Next step is State of Maine approval of their 501(c) 3. Once that happens they will be able to establish a bank account to accept the contributions that the founding members have promised. Caryl also reported that we will be working with the local firefighters association to provide CO (Carbon Monoxide) detectors to those in need in Raymond. As a start, we have bought 10 detectors out of the Sommers fund. A set amount from the Sommers fund will be available each year to continue this project. Judy reported that the Thanksgiving basket project has been successfully completed. She also reported that we will be giving Walmart gift cards to the local schools for their Christmas gifts for kids program.

Moderator: Tom reported that he has spoken with a gentleman who would like to use our facility for a Karate class. He suggested that he get in touch with Raymond Arts Alliance. There was no old business. There is no Weathervane published in December. To Do lists were discussed. The next meeting will be January 8, at 6:45 PM

Rev Nancy Retirement and Next Steps for Pastor

Recently Rev Nancy let us know that she plans to retire after worship on Easter April 12, 2020. After nearly 15 years with us, it is difficult to think about Nancy's departure and next steps, yet, we must.

The Council used a portion of the Annual meeting to discuss this topic with the 19 people (members and friends) in attendance. There is a 2-page document that was handed out in the annual meeting which is attached to the email with this Weathervane. Here is a quick outline of the information discussed.

- RVCC Council and congregation have been notified by letter and/or email
- Maine Conference UCC has been notified and is determining which of the 2 Conference Ministers will support this church in our next steps.
 - Note: There are currently 31 churches seeking pastors.
- During Annual meeting, the following items were asked and answered:
 - RVCC is a UCC church. Please affirm that we will seek an authorized minister of the United Church of Christ. *Yes* (17 people)
 - (For a church to be operational and even "vibrant" it takes everyone.) Do you actively seek to keep the church open? Yes (17 people)
 - As the answer to the prior question was "Yes" and it will take work to keep the church open and find a pastor, the congregation was asked to "stand up and be counted" to do that work 16 people stood
 - We discussed what Rev Nancy does now (info available from any Council member), then listed the top 3 priorities for the next pastor
 - 1. Lead worship and visit the sick/shut in (takes over 50% of available time)
 - 2. Help RVCC transition from a long-time pastor to be ready for the next pastor
 - 3. Work with the RVCC congregation to move forward with the RVCC vision

The next pastor would need to spend less time on administration, meetings, community work, etc. in order to focus on priorities 2 and 3 above.

We agreed we needed more time to talk as a congregation about pastor next step. The group at annual meeting decided we should meet on Sunday February 16 immediately after worship and we will bring a pot luck lunch. The topics to be discussed about pastoral search will be:

- 1. What type of pastor should we seek? Interim? Pastoral supply? Please refer to the attachment with the Weathervane for definitions of types and how to decide.
- 2. How long might the tenure of the next pastor be? Why?
- 3. Discuss key elements of the RVCC profile (required to seek a pastor)

The Council plans to work with the information provided at annual meeting and future congregational meetings to start/continue the search. **YOU** are a part of this process, so please continue to work with us. Whenever you have questions or have input to provide, whether in a meeting or at a different time, contact any Council member **please!**


