#### From the Pastor ...

Dear Church Members and Friends,

Although this is not the summer you might have anticipated, I hope you find some delight in being outside and enjoying the warm weather as we navigate our way through a very unusual year.

Thanks to excellent lay leadership, we continue to tape our services in the sanctuary.

We do not know what the future will hold, but the council continues to stay informed about the latest guidelines to a potential reopening of the sanctuary. On July 21st, Mr. Richard Karg MS, a national/international consultant for epidemics and pandemics, presented a webinar on church ventilation and air quality during this pandemic. Mr. Karg is on the ASHRAE (American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers), Epidemic Task Force. Other churches from Maine joined us for this webinar.

Our goal is to keep everyone safe and not to compromise anybody's health. We look forward to welcoming you for in-person worship services beginning on Sunday, August 23rd, at 10:00. It will be the first opportunity to worship together in the sanctuary since March. The planned safety guidelines are in this newsletter. The service will be recorded for those who do not feel comfortable participating in-person.

The council feels the risk is low because the windows will be open during the summer months allowing for adequate airflow. We will re-evaluate after six weeks.

We have begun our small "getting to know each other" gatherings next to the memorial garden under the canopy. Everybody brought their lunch and their chair. It was a delight to meet you in person and beautiful to witness you reconnecting with one another after four months of not seeing each other. We will continue having these small gatherings in the next couple of months.

#### Missions Corner

Thank you from the Town of Raymond for the church donation of \$300 to the <u>Town of Raymond's summer</u> <u>Backpack program</u> which is currently distributing food to 10-12 very appreciative families per week.

<u>Sebago Lakes Region Fuller Center for Housing</u> is raising money to be able to help seniors in Raymond, Windham and Standish via a virtual bike ride between Sept 12<sup>th</sup> and Sept 26<sup>th</sup>. The **Raymond Food Pantry** is in good shape right now! I talked with the Food Pantry Director, Gary Bibeau on July 9 and here is what I learned. The Raymond Food Pantry has received money that alleviates some of the strain they were feeling in March/April/May.

- 1. With the help and support of Cathy Gosselin, Deputy Chief & Health Officer Raymond Fire/Rescue and Jessica Fay, Representative to Maine Legislature, the Food Pantry applied for and received a "Cares Act" award that will pay a lot of the annual expenses for running the pantry.
- 2. The Food Pantry applied for and received a grant for 4 new tables. This is great news as the existing tables were breaking down...not a pretty scene when they are loaded with boxes of food!
- 3. Many people sent cash donations to the Food Pantry at PO Box 900 Raymond and this money is used to supplement food for distribution.

For all of you who have been a part of this, THANK YOU! RVCC will stay in touch with the Food Pantry.

This month, the Mission team will send a donation to **Feeding America**, a nationwide network of 200 food banks and 60,000 food pantries and meal programs that provides food and services to people each year. Together, they are the nation's largest domestic hunger-relief organization. They work to get nourishing food – from farmers, manufacturers, and retailers – to people in need. At the same time, they also seek to help the people we serve to build a path to a brighter, food-secure future. Additional information from their website.

The Feeding America network of food bands has a robust infrastructure and a high degree of coordination. They secure donations from national food and grocery manufacturers, retailers, shippers, packers and growers and from government agencies. They have a staff that works to match excess food with food banks that most need it.

The food banks distribute food and grocery items through food pantries and meal programs that serve families, children, seniors and individuals at risk of hunger. Last year alone, the Feeding America network distributed more than 3.6 billion meals to people in need.

The Feeding America nationwide network of food banks also supports programs that improve food security among the people we serve; educates the public about the problem of hunger; and advocates for legislation that protects people from going hungry. Individuals, charities, businesses and government all have a role in ending hunger.

# Need some help playing the prerecorded weekly services?

Here is some information that might help.

The easiest way to access the weekly services is to subscribe to the weekly e-mail that is sent out on Thursdays of each week. If you are not already receiving this e-mail please send an e-mail to <a href="mailto:office@rvccme.org">office@rvccme.org</a> to request your e-mail added to the list. If you open the PDF version of the attached document there is a link to the YOUTUBE channel for the church. Click on the link. The link looks like this

The next way is to open your Internet service on your computer (Google, Microsoft Edge, Safari, Explorer, etc.) In the Search field type in "YOUTUBE Channel". At the YOUTUBE Channel website Search for "Raymond Village Community Church". There are a few selections. Look for the one with the most subscribers and it says service and sermons in the description. Open this channel by clicking on the picture of the church. Move your curser over the picture of the service you wish to view and click on the picture. Generally, the most recent service will be the first video listed. Find the subscribe button and you will not have to do the Search anymore. This channel will then be listed under your subscriptions.

# Summary of July 7, 2020 Coordinating Council Meeting DRAFT

The regular monthly meeting of the coordinating council and Deacons was called to order at 5:30 PM, on Tuesday, July 7, 2020, by Tom Wiley. Present were Tom, Rolf, Brenda, Nancy, Caryl, Judy, Deb and Pastor Petra. The meeting was held remotely, each of us in their own homes, via Zoom. An end time of 7:00 PM was determined for the meeting.

Caryl offered the opening prayer

Rolf made a motion to approve the minutes of June 23, seconded by Nancy and approved.

**Treasurer's Report:** Brenda reported that current contributions were \$4,004 in the general fund, less than budget by \$1,563 for the month, and \$2,181 under budget for the year. There was no income from fundraisers. Income from the Raymond Arts Alliance will be reconciled and paid in July, it will be less than \$400, their activities obviously have been very limited this year. Investment income included an adjustment for gains of \$7,924 in the American Funds account. This almost covered the loss we recorded for the first quarter. Total income of \$13,494 is over budget for the month. Excluding gain on investments, this was under budget by \$2,419, and under budget by \$5,755 year to date. Latest estimate expects that income will be under budget by \$6,190 at the end of the year. Expenses were under budget in all categories for the month. Normally we would have paid our conference dues in May, we have not yet received that bill, will follow up on that. Rolf also wants to do work on the door at the parsonage this year, that will be an additional expense. It was suggested that we try to do pot roast dinners, as take outs, this summer. We will need to advertise. Rolf will talk to Craig about this, possibly do it the end of July. A motion was made by Judy, seconded by Rolf, and approved to accept the Treasurer's Report subject to year end review.

**Clerk:** nothing to report

**Trustees:** Rolf reported that the tarp is up over the patio. Also, the fire monitoring system is up and working.

Missions: Caryl reported that our primary July mission will be Feeding America. The Raymond Food Pantry is in better shape than it has been. Caryl is serving as our representative on the board of the Fuller Center. They are doing a major fund raiser, a bike ride. More details coming on how that can be done. Also, the North Windham Church is doing a fundraising concert for

Fuller Center on July 11, featuring Dan Strange and Ashley Liberty. It will be a remote event. Caryl will continue to put articles in all church email about racism. Resources are coming out from UCC conference, as well as other denominations.

**Christian Education:** Pastor Petra would like to see one of the Sunday School rooms fixed up and more user friendly. We agreed that it is a good idea, will pursue it.

**Stewardship:** nothing to report

**Deacons:** The Deacons confirmed new taping times. Through July, Fridays will work best. Petra will be in touch with supply pastor filling in for her in August, and discuss taping two services on one day.

**Moderator:** Tom is aware that he needs to get a Pastoral Relations Committee up and running as soon as possible. He had hoped that we would be back to worship as normal before picking a third member for the group.

**Pastor:** Petra would like to organize several small bring your own lunch meetings with members and friends. She is anxious to put faces to names. She is hoping that as we are calling members and friends about returning to church, we can mention this. Caryl suggested that we finish our calling by July 14. Nancy had completed all of her calls, all but one would be comfortable to return to worship in person with the guidelines we are proposing.

**Old Business:** Rolf reported that we are having website problems, need to wait on training. He is still working with Dan on the office computer. He is having doubts about using Google Drive. Petra's computer is up and running, however.

Equipment needs: Will Feagans joined us and presented us with lists of equipment and prices for us to consider in order to upgrade our sound system, and in order to livestream our services. After explanations by Will and discussion, Caryl Gilman made a motion to spend \$1572 to purchase the equipment, computer, and 1050ti component for the computer in order to be able to livestream services. The motion was seconded by Brenda and Nancy. It was explained that this expense will not come out of our general fund. After discussion, it was recommended that we up this amount to \$1800 to allow for other things, such as cables, which we might need. Caryl changed her motion to read \$1800, the motion was seconded again and passed. Will will give the information to Rolf for purchasing. We will meet again on Tuesday, July 21, at 5:30. On the agenda will be take out suppers, feed back from phone calls

agenda will be take out suppers, feed back from phone calls we have been making, and the luncheons which Petra is proposing.

And there are many things in today's technological world that we probably shouldn't trust. And we shouldn't follow the directions but sometimes we do get caught up in scams, half baked ideas, and even lies. So where do we turn? What can we trust? How can we follow the directions? The answer was written many years ago.

One of my fellow deacons, has a notebook with a picture of bible on the front. The message it contains is so powerful. It says, "Open the book and follow the directions." That is all we need to do.

It still holds true today, perhaps even more than ever. Just open the book and follow the directions.....

#### Safety/Freedom from Fear

Last month, July, this section broached the subject of antiracism and provided a couple of websites with resources. Since that time, in the July 9th All Church email included a list of anti-racism resources from the seven member denominations of the Maine Council of Churches. (Maine UCC is one denomination.) Between the lists and news on TV and books and more, it could be easy to overwhelmed! Where to start? What to do? I certainly don't have the answers for you but I can give you some of my thoughts, which are still forming and changing as I learn more.

A good friend reminded me to start with focusing on my core beliefs, in this conversation and in others. Much is contained in Micah 6:8 (NIV) and I add "show kindness" He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the LORD require of you?

To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.

Even after I was able to articulate that, I was still "swamped" with too many choices. So, I thought and prayed and realized that, until I starting looking at other people's perspective about racism, I was just seeing things through my own "lens". I have learned over the years that the way I see a situation is often different from the way another person may see the same situation. (Even if we are standing together watching at the same time!) This makes sense because we may have come from different parts of the country, with differing heritages/customs, and with differing experiences. This helped me realize that my focus for learning about racism and anti-racism, would start right now on learning about people who are different from me in one or more ways. A couple of examples

- Reading: Recently, I read an interview with Tyler Perry in People magazine where he talks about feeling "...exhausted from all the hate, and the division, the vitriol I see online from one to another....." yet he still is carrying on and helping others
- Watching movies or documentaries such as "Just Mercy", a movie about a black man wrongly accused of killing a white woman and"
  Becoming" a Netflix documentary about Michelle Obama looking at her life, hopes and connection with others as she tours with her book "Becoming." Most recently "John Lewis: Good Trouble" regarding his role in promoting non-violence.

I plan to continue this process through the summer. I hope these thoughts are helpful to you.

#### **Church Re-Opening Guidelines**

The Council and Deacons met on July 21 and decided that it is time to re-open RVCC for in-person worship. Our first worship service in the Sanctuary will be August 23, 2020.

While we look forward to everyone back in the Sanctuary, we understand that some people will not feel comfortable attending in person, so we will continue offering a remote worship option. Our plan is to begin livestreaming services starting August 23, but if we have technical difficulties, services will be recorded and available on YouTube by the Tuesday following worship.

First, we ask that you not attend if: you have any symptoms of illness such as a fever of 100 degrees F or more, new cough, new sore throat, new runny nose or nasal congestion, new shortness of breath, new muscle aches/fatigue, new loss of smell/taste, chest pain.

#### What do I need to do in order to attend?

- **Bring your favorite mask!** All congregants <u>must</u> wear a face mask at all times in the church. Please plan to bring your own mask.
- Plan to arrive a few minutes early so that the worship service can start as close to on-time as possible. Remaining socially distant, and being mindful of others will take a little time.

#### What will happen when I arrive?

- Everyone will be asked to enter through the front doors. Maintain social distancing as you come into the church. The Vestry entrance will not be used.
- **Greetings!** Upon entering the building, you will be greeted by a Deacon or Assistant who will give you a mask if you need one and ask you to use the hand sanitizer.
- Some pews will be blocked off. A Deacon or Deacon Assistant may direct you to a seat, to maintain proper distancing. We will be using every-other-pew and only two people will be seated per pew in order to maintain a 6-foot social distancing minimum. The exception will be for two or more members of the same family who may be seated together in the same pew. Maintain distancing as you locate a seat.
- Hugging, hand-shaking, close contact are discouraged. Remember, we're still doing our part to stop the virus' spread. This will be hard for many of us but keep in mind that it is temporary.

#### **Worship Service Format**

- Unsafe to sing, or to have unison speaking. You will primarily be hearing from Pastor Petra and the Deacon on duty.
- The bibles and hymnals have been temporarily removed from the pews. All relevant information for the worship will be in Bulletins placed in pews.

- Communion Sunday will look a little different. For everyone's safety, we will provide pre-packaged juice and wafer in pews when you enter on Communion Sundays. This way fewer hands will touch the Communion elements.
- Children in church. Your children who are old enough to wear a mask are welcome to sit with you during the church service. We ask that you please be socially distance-minded and not allow children to walk around the building but remain with you during the service.
- Offerings we will not 'pass the plate'. Instead, there will be a designated basket near the entrance of the sanctuary for you to place your donations. You can also set up automatic weekly donations.
- The only restrooms which will be available are those on the same level as the sanctuary, just outside the office.
- **No coffee hour yet.** While there is still a chance of spreading the coronavirus, we must be vigilant in doing our part. So, there will not be a Fellowship Café before church or coffee hour following the service. The Vestry will be off limits.
- Exiting the church. Please remember social distancing as you leave the building and go to the parking lot. We will have back rows exit first and then move forward. There will be markings on the floor of the sanctuary to remind us of safe 6 foot distances.

We look forward to welcoming you back to RVCC!

#### **Knitting Group**

The knitting and crocheting group is now meeting outside at the church, on the patio, under the tarp, surrounded a beautiful garden. We meet the second and fourth Tuesday of the month (weather permitting). You are welcome to join us! Here are the things you need you know....

- Bring your own chair. If you do not happen to have one to bring, we can borrow a folding chair from the church, but we will need to sanitize it afterward.
- We need to maintain the 6 foot distancing rule.
- Bring something to drink. It is possible to get some water inside in case you forget. The leader will be the designated "water-geterer".
- The bathrooms are available in case they are needed. The leader will sanitize after the meeting.
- In general, anything used from inside the church will have to be sanitized afterward.
- If you are not feeling well, please stay home. If you are uncomfortable with socialization in this situation please do not feel you have to attend.
- Face masks are optional as along as we are distancing effectively – unless of course you decide you feel the need to sing! – then we need to move back or "mask up"!
