Summary of October 13, 2020 Coordinating Council Meeting - DRAFT

The meeting of council members and deacons was called to order via zoom on Tuesday, October 13, 2020 by Tom Wiley. Present were Tom, Pastor Petra, Brenda, Rolf, Nancy, Caryl, Deb, and Judy.

Judy offered the opening prayer, the 23rd Psalm.

The agenda was reviewed, end time of 7:00 PM was set. Rolf made a motion to accept the minutes of September 15, 2020, seconded by Brenda and approved.

Treasurer's Report: Brenda presented the financial report for September. Current contributions were \$5,517 for the month in the general fund. This was less than budget by \$50 for the month, and under budget by \$1,927 for the year. This included \$1,700 of unexpected, unpledged contributions. Income from fundraisers included \$546 from Pot Roast supper, about the same as last month, \$90 from grocery card sales, and a payment from RAA of \$145, for a total of \$781 income from fundraisers. An adjustment of \$3,134 was made, increasing the valuation of the American Funds at the end of September. This reverses the decrease that was recorded after the first quarter of this year. The account now reflects an increase of \$295 for the year. Total income of \$10,928 was over budget by \$2,989 for the month, and under budget by \$2,889 year to date. Total expenses of \$5,749 were under budget by \$1,836 for the month. Most of this was in pastoral ministry, because budget assumed Nancy's salary and benefits; plus there were no cleaning bills paid in September, this will likely appear in October. Current month net excess income/expenses of \$5,134 was better than budget excess income of \$309. Most of this variance for the month comes from the positive adjustment to the valuation of American Funds.

Clerk: Judy had nothing to report. Caryl had some questions about reporting of year end statistics in this pandemic year. Caryl will try to reach out to conference office about these.

Trustees: Rolf has pulled air conditioners out of windows. He is still waiting on scouts to do some outside work. The scouts have not started to have meetings in the church yet.

Missions: Petra reported that she had recently met up with Jessica Moore. The street ministry in Portland is very grateful for our donation of socks. Caryl talked about how we can help Maine Seacoast Mission for Christmas. People will be able to go on to Amazon to select gifts, saving Caryl from some mailing. Judy reported that we will not be collecting food and putting together Thanksgiving baskets. The Raymond Food Pantry will provide baskets for Thanksgiving to their clients. Judy will be in touch with the social worker at the Raymond Schools, we will provide Hannaford gift cards for families which she identifies who do not get help from the food pantry.

Stewardship: Brenda reported that she has a letter written to go out with end of September statements to those who pledge. With a few revisions, and a pledge card, this could be

Deacons: The Deacons had had a recent meeting at which they discussed how taping was going, Christmas season, and thoughts about Christmas Eve. They would propose 2 services on Christmas Eve, one at 4:30, the other at 6 or 6:30. One of the services will be taped for those unable to attend. We would need

a Stewardship letter. Stewardship Sunday will be November 8.

to allow enough time for disinfection between services. People would have to make a reservation to attend, numbers would be limited. We are thinking about asking Patrick to return and participate, possibly a guest vocalist who could be recorded remotely. Petra will contact Patrick.

Moderator: nothing to report

Pastor: Petra reported that she is taking boundary training on November 7, via zoom. She is also participating in an online workshop titled "Shaping Faith in Crisis" through the Presbyterian Older Adult Ministries Network, on October 27 and 28. Also her transfer from Oxford County is completed. Brenda and Caryl continue to work on the web page, they welcome feedback.

Old Business: The town of Raymond and the Sheriff's office are discouraging Halloween activities on Main Street, so the church will not be open for Halloween.

Music: Decision has yet to be made on someone to play hymns etc. each Sunday.

Schedule for Taping: Deb and Rolf will do it on October 11 and November 8. Meghan is willing to do 3 Sundays in November. Feedback on having live services: Everyone seems to be comfortable with how things are going at this point. We will not be opening windows as much as weather gets cooler. Rolf suggested bringing up heat in the sanctuary well before start of service, then turning off circulating fan during the service. Our heating system can not filter out the virus. There was mention of winter weather and ice on the front steps, we may need to go in through the vestry.

October 25 service with Conference: The service will be broadcast as a zoom meeting which we will join, Rolf will set up screen and show it on that. We need to remind people what is happening that day, with signs, announcements etc.

New Business:

Rental Request: We have received a request for rental of a room on Saturdays mornings for a preschool music class. Teacher has agreed to pay \$100 per month for first three months, then an increasing rate based on attendance. We need to replace the lights in that room. Rolf can do the work, cost will be about \$300. Caryl made a motion, seconded by Nancy and approved to spend that amount.

As use of rooms increases with cooler weather, Deb suggested that we should consider putting signs with occupancy limit on each room.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:00 PM. The next meeting will be on Tuesday, November 17, at 5:30, via zoom.

Sebago Lakes Region Fuller Center for Housing

On Saturday, October 3, I was one of 5 volunteers who worked on replacing a rotting deck, steps and railing for a senior in Windham. After "masking up", then signing a form saying we had not been near people with COVID and having our temp taken, we were ready to go. I spent the first half of the day with a crow bar taking apart the existing deck along with 2 other people. Then, I partnered up with another woman to measure and cut boards for the new deck with a chop saw. By 4pm, the new deck was on! The two most experienced people decided to finish details on Monday and it is all done now. The homeowner was very grateful!

An Anti-Racism Conversation

In the past two Weathervanes, we first talked a bit about ourselves, then our view of the Fear Zone. Then we shared our thoughts on the Learning Zone. This month we are applying our curiosity to be more aware of anti-racist viewpoints.

Petra: The first statement that speaks to me is how I identify with unknowingly benefiting from racism, considering that I am an average looking white, middleaged white woman. I don't have any remarkable or added tattoos or piercings on my face. Here are some examples that come to mind, being pulled over by the police, my first thought was the price of my speeding ticket (Yes, I was speeding) rather than thinking about the possibility of going to jail for a relatively minor traffic violation.

I have a black friend who has trouble finding a hairdresser in Maine who can style and cut her hair type.

Additionally, I never gave it a thought about putting a band-aid on my wounds until recently, a young immigrant from Africa, showing me her arm that covered a cut with a band-aid matching her skin color.

The second phrase I picked on the Growth Zone chart asks us to surround ourselves when given the opportunity with different people.

Last year I had an opportunity to help out at a clothes closet located in a local Church in Portland. One day

several ladies who had recently immigrated from Africa, were looking for jackets and shoes. Despite our language barrier, they did not know English and I do not know French. We were able to muddle through our conversation with gestures and drawings. It would have been easy for me to walk away and find someone who knows French, but I chose to stay with the ladies and forge a relationship even just for a few minutes.

Caryl: I wish I could say I relate to all of the statements listed, but it turns out the only one I can say at this point is "I don't let mistakes deter me from being better." I think this is because I'm still in the Learning Zone. The thing about making mistakes is that I can learn from them. I met a man with very black skin and referred to him as African American. It turns out his origin was not in Africa but Haiti. He said he preferred I ask his heritage vs. assume that his skin color meant a specific origin. What I do now, if referring to someone I have met but not had a chance to discuss heritage is a "person of color". And, I recognize some people will not appreciate this reference and it's OK. I'll get to learn more!

Petra: The other statement I could relate to is: I don't let my mistakes deter me from being better.

I found myself in a particular situation with a person who neither identified with being female or male. I mistakenly thought the person was a male and proceeded to introduce 'him' to another friend, saying: "This is "Max," and it is his first time visiting us today. Max immediately responded that he preferred being introduced them/they. Thankfully, Max has been gracious as I sometimes forget that they (Max) do not want to be confined by female or male pronouns. It does take practice!

As we think about being part of the solution on the topic of "Becoming Anti-Racist" I am reminded of Micah 6:8:

And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.

Petra and Caryl: We would like to start a discussion group in January with anyone who is interested. Depending upon the number of people, it might be in the vestry if we can maintain 6ft distance and/or it will be on Zoom. What would you be interested in discussing? We want to make this something you want to attend. Examples could be: Why do I need to think about racism when I live in Maine? Please contact Petra or Caryl if you are interested. STEWARDSHIP SUNDAY IS NOVEMBER 8TH



Maine Conference 89th Annual Meeting

As with everything this year, this meeting was through webinar instead of in person. While I didn't actually "attend", I did read through the business reports and will provide summary information here. I will cover 4 items starting with the Conference budget for 2021.

The Conference presented a reasonable balanced <u>budget for 2021</u>. About 1/3 of this is the balanced budget for Pilgrim Lodge, which has not always been the case. More information below

Maine Conference Staff has had many changes in 2020. Just as RVCC is working through where we have been, where we are now and where we are going, the Maine Conference is in the same process. Rev. Deborah Blood, who has been Conference Minister for 5 years, has moved on and the Conference Board selected The Rev Jonna Jensen as Interim Conference minister for 18-24 months. She is an experienced, thoughtful minister who will help the Conference prepare for the Conference minister believed to be called to journey with the Maine Conference into the future. Rev. Darren Morgan, Conference Associate Minister for 12 years, moved in May to pastor a church in Orleans MA. The Rev. Dr. Deborah Jenks is now in the role of Interim Associate Conference Minister.

In January, the Conference hired Rev Jen Paty, Pastor Jen, as Outdoor Ministry Director to lead life and ministry at <u>Pilgrim Lodge</u>. When she was hired, no one knew there would be a pandemic or that the on-site outdoor programs would have to be cancelled for the summer. I know this was a blow to many kids and adults who love their time at Pilgrim Lodge, including me! There was a lot of activity this summer with 53 volunteers logging over 2000 hours of work on maintenance projects for the board walk, cabins, Quito, painting, rebuilding the art room and more! They also launched fund-raising to cover the loss of registration fees and are 75% to their goal. Lastly, the leadership team spent many hours looking at how to have a balanced budget and sustainable program in future. I pray for their success.

Lastly, the Conference presented Minister Compensation Guidelines for the coming year which is believed to be a COLA increase of 1.3% that matches that of the Social Security Administration.
