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# From the Pastor ...

November 29<sup>th</sup> marks the first Sunday of Advent, a period of four weeks during which we prepare for Christmas. Historically, Advent was a somber season, a mini Lent, a time for deep penitence. We have moved from viewing Advent as a season of fasting and penitence to a time of expectant waiting and preparation. It is no surprise that we are an impatient culture and Advent challenges us and encourages us to be reflective and learn how to patiently wait. For the child who lives in all of us it could be waiting to see what is under the tree on Christmas morning. What will the surprise gift be? For the adults it might be connecting with loved ones via Zoom, Skype, Face-time, Instagram, or even snail mail.

When I was growing up we would sit at the kitchen table with our parents every Sunday afternoon during the season of Advent and light the candles on the Advent wreath. We enjoyed eating special cake and drinking hot chocolate and our anticipation grew with each subsequent week. Each candle lit brought us closer to the celebration on Christmas day. As we grew up we realized that our simple Advent traditions were also a reminder of what the season was really about.

The Advent candles we will light at our church represent four inspirational themes: hope, peace, joy and love. During this season, may you find time to reflect, write, dream, paint or share any other artistic gifts and express new possibilities and new hopes.

May you also ponder upon scriptures to find hope for our future.

First Sunday of Advent: "The days are surely coming, says God, when I will fulfill my promise"...(Jeremiah 33:14).

Second Sunday of Advent: "The dawn from on high will break upon us, to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace" (Luke1: 78-79)

Third Sunday of Advent: "Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and thanksgiving let your request be known to God" (Philippians 4:6)

Fourth Sunday of Advent: "And they shall live secure..." (Micah 5:4c)

# Keeping You Safe

As COVID numbers are increasing across the State, we wish to reassure you that your safety is always a concern and let you know what we are doing to try to keep everyone safe.

First, we are now requiring that everyone in the sanctuary, including the Pastor, Deacon and musician, wear a face covering at all times. We are considering installing plexiglass shields on the lectern, Pulpit and piano.

As cold weather has arrived and we must keep windows closed, we turn the heat up in the hours before the service so the room is at a comfortable level of warmth during the service, but turn off the heat during services so that the blower cannot act to circulate the virus.

Hand sanitizer is available as you enter and we encourage everyone to use it. Your bulletin and communion elements, are already placed in the pews. No offering plates are passed, instead donations can be placed in a basket at the rear of the church.

At the infrequent times when outside groups use the sanctuary, the space is sanitized thoroughly. Most groups using the church are using spaces other than the sanctuary.

For those of you who do not or cannot attend services in person, we continue to have the services recorded and are available to you on our you tube channel.

#### In Memory of Robert Victor Metz

Robert (Bob) Metz, 94, of Cresskill, NJ died peacefully at Sunrise of Cresskill, NJ on November 4, 2020. The son of Victor and Alice (Larsen) Metz, Bob was born August 21, 1926 and grew up in Rutherford, NJ. He graduated from Blair Academy High School, Blairstown, NJ in 1944. Bob loved his time at Blair as well as his summers spent in Sharon, CT at his Uncle Albert's farm. Bob enlisted in the Merchant Marines, Kings Point, NY and served the last two years of WWII on various ships transporting troops throughout Europe. After the war, Bob graduated from NYU where he earned his degree in physical education. At NYU he met his future wife Gloria Rauh. Together they raised three children in Paramus, NJ. After graduating from NYU, Bob took a position as a teacher and coach at Poly Prep, Brooklyn, NY. He then moved to NJ to work at Fairleigh Dickinson University. In his 32 years at FDU, he served as intramural director, professor and chairman of the physical education department, wrestling coach, golf coach, and Associate Athletic Director. He also co-founded the Metropolitan Athletic Conference and served as president of the Metropolitan Wrestling Coaches Association.

Bob had an interesting and varied background in working with young people. In the early 50's Metz ran the Bergen-Passaic handicapped children's camp which operated at a Westwood campsite. Later, he spent his summers at Camp Hawthorne in Maine where he was the waterfront director and head counselor. He would later go on to become owner and director of Camp Hawthorne. In 1986 he and Gloria moved to Raymond, Maine to spend their retirement years. Although retired, Bob was very active in the Raymond Village Community Church, was chairman of Tassel Top, the town's park and beach, chairman of the Camp Sunshine golf fundraiser and president of his road association. He also continued for many years as his class rep for Blair Academy keeping in touch with fellow classmates and writing the class notes.

Bob was an active golfer and skier and loved spending time with Gloria on the lake boating and enjoying the beautiful Maine scenery. He was a great story teller and quick to laugh. Bob Metz had a zest for life, a unique ability to find joy in each day, and to share that joy with anyone who came into his life. He adored his wife and family, cherished his friendships and had a special place in his heart for each of his grandchildren and great grandchildren who brought him immense happiness.

Bob is survived by his children, Pamela and husband Ken, Richard and wife Carole, and Peter and wife Mally, as well as five grandchildren, Kevin, Ryan, Lorraine, Tyler and Lindsey and two great children, Raleigh and Arlo.

# Summary of November 17, 2020 Coordinating Council Meeting - DRAFT

A joint meeting of the coordinating council and deacons was called to order via zoom on Tuesday, November 17, 2020, by Tom Wiley. Present were Tom, Rolf, Brenda, Caryl, Nancy, Deb, and Judy.

Deb offered the opening prayer.

The agenda was reviewed, it was determined that we will try to end by 7:00 PM.

Treasurer's Report: Brenda presented the financial report for October. Current contributions were \$4,039 for the month in the General Fund. This was less than budget by \$1,478 for the month, and by \$3,405 for the year. Pledged contributions were \$3,189 for the month. We have been averaging between \$3,000 and \$4,000 per month, so this is typical. Income from supper fund raiser was \$655, but did not include cost of food. Grocery card sales was \$95. No rental income was recorded for the month, this is a shortfall of \$1177. It is expected in November. Total income of \$4,839, was under budget by \$2,000 for the month and by \$4,890 for the year. Expenses included pastoral ministry of \$3,732, under budget because budget assumes numbers from Rev. Nancy. Other expenses include Diaconate at \$500, Administrative at \$1,038, and Trustees at \$2,783. Total expenses of \$8,053 was under budget by \$1,710 for the month. There were no transactions in PP&E fund for the month. Contributions to missions for the month was \$213, mission payments for the month was \$1,052. Brenda did report that she had to take money from American Funds for cash flow purposes. Caryl made a motion, seconded by Nancy and approved to accept the treasurer's report subject to year end review.

**Pledge Report:** As of Sunday, November 15, we had received 6 pledges for cleaning totaling \$2,180, 13 pledges for general fund totaling \$28, 920, and one pledge for missions for \$600. These numbers are not far off of last years totals at the same time.

## Reports of the Coordinators:

**Clerk:** nothing to report

**Trustees:** Rolf reported that the lights to be installed in the classroom have been received. He also has the cable to run from the office through the attic to the sanctuary. This will allow us to start live streaming our services. He needs an extra set of hands for these projects, Will Feagans might help. He has someone lined up to plow the parking lot for the winter, still needs someone to shovel.

**Missions:** Caryl reported that we have funded purchase and installation of ten CO detectors in Raymond homes through the Somers fund. Our mission for December will be Maine Seacoast Mission. In addition, in December, usually at the Christmas Eve Service, we take an offering for the Veterans of the Cross. We will also collect for that on December 20. She is proposing that our mission for

January be Daisy's Children. Rolf expressed concern that we did not prepare enough hot meals for the food pantry on our usual Thursday in November. Caryl reported that it is hard to predict how many clients might show up. She will talk to Gary at the food pantry about this, and also about best Thursday for the hot meal in December.

**Deacons:** The Deacons met last week. They discussed plans for Christmas Eve service. There will be only one service, at 4:30 PM, it will be open first to those without internet access. The service will be taped, and available on You Tube by 6:00 PM. There was discussion about the fact that the church will be open the evening of December 5 to view the Windham Chamber Singers concert. Additional cleaning will need to be done after that service because we will be in church the next morning, less than 24 hours after the program the night before. There was discussion about looking into shields for the pulpits, masking of minister and deacon does impact quality of taping.

**Moderator:** nothing to report at this point in the meeting. Old Business: Rolf reminded us that now that heat is on, and windows are closed, we should turn the heat up before the service, so we can turn it and the fan off during the service. Caryl suggested that we should put something in the Weathervane to remind people what we are doing to make sure they are safe in the sanctuary. Brenda has hoped for the past two months that we would get to the issues of handicap parking and accessibility to the sanctuary. Unfortunately we have had a lot on our plates and don't get to this discussion. A small group will meet to start this work. Judy will provide them with copies of previous minutes in which this topic was discussed. Brenda also reported that we have entered into an agreement with Keith Neubert to provide music on Sunday mornings. Thanks to the Music Committee for their work. **New Business:** There was discussion on Annual Meeting. We need to have it, our charter requires it, we need a budget approved, and officers elected. It will be held on January 24, 2021, at 1:00 PM, via zoom. There will be a special all church email with the zoom invitation, and with information which people will need – i.e. budget, slate of officers, annual report etc. We will make an effort to provide those without zoom capability the chance to give us their input. In the annual report, there will be no report for Christian Education, Tom will write the annual reports for music and Deacons, Caryl will write the "Our Wider Church" report. Since people may be printing the annual report on their home printers, we should make sure that Lori condenses the number of pages, we do not need a page for each report. There was brief discussion on criteria to be used if we want to go to all virtual services. No decision was made. At this point, as long as we are taping on Sunday mornings in the sanctuary, we are open to those who feel comfortable coming.

Raymond Food Pantry: The month of November saw an increase in the number of families served – up from approximately 32 to 40. The pantry provided a Thanksgiving meal this year including a turkey or a gift card for a turkey. On December 24<sup>th</sup>, the RVCC "community meals" team is preparing a hot meal for each Food Pantry patron to be handed out that evening. Many of you ask if they have enough funding and the answer is "yes" (for now).

**Thanksgiving Baskets:** In addition to baskets provided to food pantry patrons, there are always a few people who need some extra help at Thanksgiving. These folks were identified through the Raymond school system. RVCC donated \$30 Hannaford gift cards for each of these families.



# Daisy's Children

January 2020, Sharon Beckwith, the founder of Daisy's Children spoke to us about how this non-profit started and what they have been able to accomplish for children in Honduras.

A Maine based organization helping over 150 impoverished children and their families in Concepcion del Norte', Santa Barbara, Honduras, with education, medical, and nutritional needs. "What began as a chance meeting of three children who lost their mother, Daisy, to malnutrition has grown to become a source of nutritional food, potable water, education, and medical intervention for 100 children in Concepcion del Norte, Honduras." A year later, January 2021, we will focus on Daisy's Children again. This time, we would like to take advantage of a program for Christmas. They have partnered with Doles Orchard Box Shop to offer an ornament for \$20 and that same amount pays for 20 meals for a child in Honduras.

We are hoping many people would be willing to donate all or a portion of \$20 for an ornament that would be used on the sanctuary Christmas tree for 2021 AND pay for meals for a child in Honduras. 
The business of the meeting shall be as follows:

# **Anti-racist Conversation**

Last month we asked you if you would be interested in joining a conversation about racism or anti-racism. So far, to my knowledge, Petra and I have not heard from anyone interested. I can understand this as it seems like the conversation could be "too big" or "too overwhelming".

I talked with my sister, Anne, who is leading a Christian women's conversation about bias. Bias is a disproportionate weight in favor of or against an idea or thing, that can be prejudicial or unfair. Biases can be innate or learned. Having a bias does not mean you are a "bad" person. The key is to recognize a bias and examine what, if any effect, that has on decisions or actions. We agreed that we were brought up to believe that higher education, college, was a key to a successful work life. I know that I carried that bias through my work life and it likely affected hiring decisions with which I was involved. Yet I also know that there are many people in this world who have been very successful without a college education.

What's the point? Knowing our own biases can help us examine whether or how they are affecting us. Conversation with others provides a way to see situations in a different light.
