


When you join with your computer:

Missions Corner

As we begin the year 2021, we retain the overall focus areas as 2020 with a special focus on food insecurity. Our plans for the first half of the year are to contribute to Food Pantries and their providers, like Good Shepherd. We will invite you to join us in contributing to a different organization each month.

Good Shepherd Food Bank

The mission of Good Shepherd Food Bank is to eliminate hunger in Maine by improving access to nutritious food for people in need, building strong community partnerships, and mobilizing the public in the fight to end hunger.

From their website: More than 70,000 children in Maine are living with food insecurity, meaning they don't always know where their next meal will come from, or if it will be enough. That means 1 out of every 5 Maine kids struggles with hunger – the highest child hunger rate in all of New England.

A local Raymond man is on the board of Good Shepherd and says he is proud of the way Good Shepherd does business. The website says Good Shepherd holds people struggling with hunger at the center of decisions and actions.

One of the sources for food, including USDA food, for Raymond Food Pantry is Good Shepherd Food Bank. In fact, that is what a food bank is all about – sourcing food to pantries that distribute the food directly to eligible patrons.

Raymond Food Pantry

And the kindness continued on January 14th when baked ziti dinners were delivered from the church to the Food Pantry, consumed by Pantry patrons and workers. As you see above, we chose Good Shepherd as the mission for February. Generally, attendance is down at the Raymond Food Pantry until April or May, so we will wait until they need us, then make the Raymond Food Pantry our mission for that month.

Maine Seacoast Mission Christmas Program Success – RVCC played a part!

RVCC contributed personal toiletry items and items from the Amazon shopping wish-list, therefore we are a part of the Success described by Seacoast Mission:

Reviewing the Mission's Christmas Program 2020, Wendy Harrington said over 1,000 people were served throughout the Mission's communities in Washington and Hancock Counties -- including several remote islands.

There were challenges due to COVID yet Wendy said "I think the significant part of this year, is that we tried to maintain what we had built for the Christmas program -parent choice for their children's gifts. The old in-person way we did the Elves Workshop was impossible. Instead, we created a virtual shopping experience."

The Mission made available an online shopping form people could use with their laptops, smartphones, and tablets. Plus, it gave people the opportunity to shop with a Mission elf.

The whole Mission Christmas tradition was carried on with the white wrapping paper tied with red string. "This year in particular," said Wendy, "anything wrapped was wrapped in the white paper with red string.

"We were filling orders until December 23rd. We really try to fulfill the requests - those Christmas dreams kids and elders have asked for. That's another hallmark of our program," she said.

Lenten Worship

The liturgical season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 17. It is a 40-day journey of reflection and preparation for Easter. The Lenten journey is modeled after Jesus Christ's time in the desert on his own, praying in the desert for 40 days leading up to Holy Week with Palm Sunday, last supper, crucifixion, and resurrection on Easter.

This year, in addition to Sunday worship, additional worship services will be offered on:

- Ash Wednesday February 17 at 6pm a brief service on Zoom
- Maunday Thursday, April 1 at 6pm a service on Zoom
- Good Friday, Friday April 2 Opportunity for at home devotional

Daisy's Children

January 2020, Sharon Beckwith, the founder of Daisy's Children spoke to us about how this non-profit started and what they have been able to accomplish for children in Honduras.

A Maine based organization helping over 150 impoverished children and their families in Concepcion del Norte', Santa Barbara, Honduras, with education, medical, and nutritional needs. "What began as a chance meeting of three children who lost their mother, Daisy, to malnutrition has grown to become a source of nutritional food, potable water, education, and medical intervention for 100 children in Concepcion del Norte, Honduras."

A year later, January 2021, we will focus on Daisy's Children again. This time, we would like to take advantage of a program for Christmas. They have partnered with Doles Orchard Box Shop to offer an ornament for \$20 and that same amount pays for 20 meals for a child in Honduras. In December, the Mission fund sent \$400 and in January, we will send \$100 for a total of \$500 which purchases 25 ornaments for the church Christmas tree and 500 meals for the children in Honduras.

Hats & Mittens





Our knitting & crocheting group meets twice a month at the Raymond Village Community church. It is not just a church group but is open to anyone in the community. Everyone is invited, regardless of skill. It is nice to meet and get new ideas and help with projects. Last year we made several hats and gave them to the Seafarer's Mission, and they were then distributed to sailors from all over the world, who come to Portland or other ports along the coast of Maine (ours made it to Portland). This year an idea was presented from a member of our group who told us about her friend, a teacher in Norway, who remarked that children were coming to school without hats & mittens. We realized that this probably happens a lot in our communities. We checked with the Raymond Elementary school and they were delighted to have us make hats & mittens for the young school children. We finished 25 sets and most of these were made from donated yarn.

Summary of Monday, January 11, 2021 Coordinating Council Meeting - DRAFT

A joint meeting of coordinating council and deacons was called to order via zoom, at 6:00 PM, on Monday, January 11, 2021 by Tom Wiley. Present were Tom, Rolf, Brenda, Caryl, Nancy, Deb, Petra, and Judy.

Tom offered the opening prayer.

The agenda was reviewed, end time was set for 7:30 PM. Rolf made a motion, seconded by Brenda and passed, to accept the minutes of the meeting of December 15, 2020.

Treasurer's Report: Brenda presented the year end 2020 financial report. Our general operating fund will end 2020 on a better financial position than we expected in the budget. Our Balance Sheet remains strong. Positive items for the year were: net increase in the total Stock Investment fund was \$14,733. Pastoral Ministry expense was lower than budget by \$18,403. Our music director retired at the end of August. In October we contracted for a church pianist, with savings for 2020 of \$925. Secretarial hours were less than budget. Heating oil expense was \$1,266 less than budget. \$1,500 in maintenance budget for the Parsonage was not spent, this will be moved to 2021 budget.

There were, however, negative items to income: there were decreases in contribution income and fund raiser income. There were unexpected expenses in Trustees totaling \$3,988. There were expenses for paying off financing and final accounting of vinyl siding project. And there was expense of \$1,579 for audio visual equipment for recording services. Nancy made a motion, seconded by Rolf, and approved to accept the treasurer's report subject to year end review.

Budget: The operating budget for 2021 is also projected to be a loss of \$24,700. Pledges and contributions will be lower than 2020, as will fundraiser events. General operating expenses are budgeted to increase by 1.5%. Caryl asked that missions pledges show in the budget.

Reports of the Coordinators:

Clerk: nothing to report

Trustees: Rolf has been working on microphone issues. He would like to have new lights installed in the downstairs classroom by January 23.

Missions: Caryl presented the missions budget for 2021. We have a plan, but are flexible to respond to unforeseen needs. We also have monies in this budget to help people with equipment needed for zoom worship.

Stewardship: 2020 year end giving statements have been mailed out.

Deacons: Caryl has agreed to be head deacon for the year 2021. Focus of Deacons now is on zoom worship, which is going well. The deacons met on Sunday afternoon, discussed Lent, even Maundy Thursday and Easter. Ash Wednesday is February 17. There will be a short zoom

worship at 6:00 PM, music will be taped ahead, Keith will not play. On Maundy Thursday, which is April 1, there will also be a service at 6 PM. There was a discussion on how to put music into zoom, just in case Keith were unable to get to church on a Sunday morning. Easter is on April 4.

Moderator: Tom thanked everyone for all their hard work. We all work well together.

Pastor: Petra has been concentrating on making zoom worship go well. We have seen snow birds joining us for worship, it was suggested that we put something in the ACE urging other snow birds to join us. There will be a Lenten Book Study, starting February 24, at 6:00 PM via zoom. The music class for young children with April Masse will start January 23.

Old Business:

Handicap access: Brenda presented a summary of past discussions and plans for improving handicap access. A committee of Brenda, Caryl, Rolf, and Bob Yates have met to try to figure out how to move forward with this. They presented their current thoughts on how to move forward with a more affordable plan. It was suggested that we take one step at a time, first step would be outside, to grade and level driveway, and apply reclaim on handicap ramp side of the building; and to remove steps of the Thrift Shop building, and grade, and apply reclaim to that area, to provide space for parking, turn around, and access to ramp into the sanctuary. Second step would be to work on entrance into sanctuary. Third step would be to build ramp from front of sanctuary to give access, through area behind pulpit, to office and rest room areas. It was also suggested that we apply for a Resourcing the Local Church grant through the Maine Conference, UCC. We do have some funds available to start this work. Brenda will rework her proposal, it will be on the agenda for the annual meeting.

Outside Groups: In addition to the Music Class due to start shortly, the only outside group using our building is AA. Scouts are meeting remotely.

New Business: Reviewed how zoom worship is working at this point. Caryl continues to work with people to help them with access problems. Even those without internet can call in. She will pass this on to people. Agenda for annual meeting was reviewed. Technical issues associated with annual meeting were reviewed. Tom has not decided where he will be. Deb will co host on zoom for the annual meeting. The ACE needs to remind people of how to get on for the annual meeting. It is the same link as for worship.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:30 PM. The next meeting will be on Tuesday, February 16, at 6:00 PM, via zoom.

Handicap Accessibility Improvements

A. Improve outside access to handicap ramp and Sanctuary.

Grade and level as necessary the driveway on the handicap ramp side of the building. Remove the steps to the Thrift Shop Building and grade for parking and turn around. Apply the necessary "reclaim" to make for a smooth surface. Grade and repave the parking area directly in front of the church (to be determined after review of the town's sidewalk plan). \$2,360

B. Install a ramp in Sanctuary to provide access to pulpit & second level.

Install a permanent ramp over the stairs to the right of the pulpit with access to the doorway leading to the bathrooms on the second level. This will also involve the removal of some of the pews to provide appropriate access. In Addition, to improve handicap egress, removing the vestibule door and renovations to front exterior door and an air curtain. \$4,735

C. Enlarge doorway inside sanctuary to provide access to second level.

Enlarge doorway on the behind the Pastor's pulpit to gain access to the 2nd level offices and bathrooms for all. Repainting the Trompe-d'Loeil design to affected wall. \$2,175


D. Construct a handicap accessible bathroom in second level.

Renovate the bathroom, closest to the sanctuary doorway, to become a handicap accessible. This will require moving the structure into the hallway, but it will still provide enough space in the hall for access. This will include all new fixtures and some plumbing changes. \$8,755

Total cost is \$18,025.

- 1. Proceed with Step A and use the funds that were raised in the Fran Main's Handicap accessibility fund. \$4,396
- 2. Apply for a grant through the UCC Cumberland Association for Step B. Determine the funding after we receive status of this grant request.
- 3. Step C & D will likely be pushed until 2022.
