Congratulations to us?

As was presented at the annual meeting, we are embarking on a multi step plan to help improve the accessibility of our church to those with handicaps. The plans for this year are to do some reshaping on the driveway area near the existing ramp, to do some rework on the entry way and vestibule entrance to the sanctuary, do some modifications to the pews on the right-hand side in the sanctuary, construct a handicap ramp in the sanctuary and to remove the porch/breezeway on the thrift shop.

It was mentioned that we would be looking at grants that could help us with the financial side of this endeavor and consequently we applied for a grant "resourcing the local church" thru the Cumberland association of the UCC. We were informed this week, that we are the recipient of this grant at the maximum amount of \$5,000.

A big thanks goes out to the team of Brenda Olsen, Caryl Gillman, Bob Yates and Rolf Olsen who pulled together the information and prepared the grant application.

Keep in mind that the awarding of the grant is only the beginning of the process The hard work starts now of getting the work done. This will need assistance from all hands. There will be things that all can do ranging from some yard work and general after construction cleaning to helping hands with much of the work. Don't wait to be asked ... volunteer now and get to the head of the line!

In this conversation about resiliency, it's important to have a positive, hopeful, solution focused outlook on what's possible.


We believe there are plenty of stories, resources and opportunities to shine a light on the goodness that is found in our communities with those celebrating prevention and freedom from addiction.
