From the Pastor ...

Dear RVCC Family and Friends,

Although it is only October, I find myself celebrating Thanksgiving early this year. Managing all the emotions surrounding my mother's terminal cancer diagnosis only three months after my father's passing has been challenging. Despite this difficult time, it is with sincere gratitude that I say thank you to this wonderful congregation for all your love, support, and prayers while I take the needed time to support my mom. You have no idea how very touched my mother and I are for all your kindness. My mom mentions often how she appreciates "her" RVCC prayer warriors and how she feels the power of those prayers. She is constantly sending her love to you all. As do I. From the bottom of my heart, thank you.

As we enter the season of fall, I came across a reflection by Parker Palmer who is one of my favorite authors. He is a writer, speaker, and activist who focuses on issues in education, community, leadership, spirituality and social change. Below are excerpts of his essay which he wrote in 1995. If you are interested in reading this article in its entirety, it can be found on fetzer.org

Autumn is a season of great beauty, but it is also a season of decline: the days grow shorter, the light is suffused, and summer's abundance decays toward winter's death. Faced with this inevitable winter, what does nature do in autumn? She scatters the seeds that will bring new growth in the spring—and she scatters them with amazing abandon.

This hopeful notion that living is hidden within dying is surely enhanced by the visual glories of autumn. What artist would ever have painted a season of dying with such a vivid palette if nature had not done it first? Does death possess a beauty that we—who fear death, who find it ugly and obscene—cannot see? How shall we understand autumn's testimony that death and elegance go hand in hand?

For me, the words that come closest to answering those questions are the words of Thomas Merton: "There is in all visible things...a hidden wholeness."

Autumn constantly reminds me that my daily dyings are necessary precursors to new life. If I try to "make" a life that defies the diminishments of autumn, the life I end up with will be artificial, at best, and utterly colorless as well. This is a beautiful reflection on the Paradox of Fall and what a wonderful way to welcome Autumn.



Summary of Tuesday, September 21, 2021 Coordinating Council/Deacons Meeting

A joint meeting of coordinating council and deacons was called to order via zoom, by Tom Wiley, on Tuesday, September 21, 2021. Present were Tom, Rolf, Brenda, Petra, Nancy, Caryl, Deb, and Judy.

Tom offered the opening prayer.

Tom reviewed the agenda, end time of 7:15 was agreed upon.

Treasurer's Report: Brenda presented the financial report for August. Income remains good. Expenses, year to date are still under budget. Total income for the month was \$8,136, over budget by \$1,678 for the month, and over by \$8,856 year to date (includes the gain of \$5,728 in the American Funds). Pledged contributions were better than expected and we also had a memorial contribution of \$500. Total expenses for the month were \$7,770, over budget by \$423 for the month, but under budget by \$5,997 year to date. Considering the fact that our financial picture remains stable, Brenda suggested that she prepare a brief one page update each month, just looking at the general fund. She would do a full report quarterly. Council members and deacons were in agreement with this suggestion. Carvl Gilman made a motion, seconded by Nancy Yates, and approved, to accept the treasurer's report subject to year end review.

Reports of the Coordinators:

Clerk: nothing to report

Trustees: Rolf reported that the ramp for the sanctuary has arrived. He is trying to schedule a work day to install it. Thanks to Caryl Gilman, front doors of the sanctuary have received a final coat of paint. The parsonage has passed its state inspection for another year. He has been in touch with the scouts about doing outdoor fall clean up, at their convenience. Brenda suggested a group to clean out the furnace room. Work on leveling the driveway and putting down reclaim could still be several weeks out. Caryl mentioned the parking area in front of the church is in bad shape. Rolf could also have that leveled and add reclaim. It will not interfere with town's sidewalk job. Rolf would like to take down the tarp over the patio so he could power wash that side of the building. We could use a pop up canopy for the October supper. But Brenda mentioned that we still use the patio for coffee hour and knitting group. It will be left up for now. Rolf continues to work on replacing florescent lights in the building. When the current round of replacements is completed, only the kitchen and office will have florescent lights.

Christian Education: nothing to report.

Stewardship: Stewardship Sunday will be November 14. Petra has a couple of speakers in mind. Brenda will talk to Petra about theme, and will do Stewardship letter.

Missions: Caryl reported we will make a donation to Preble Street in September. She also will talk to Raymond Fire Department about possible need for CO detector/alarm in Raymond homes. We have installed CO detector/alarm and a smoke detector in home of one of our own members. A donation was made for Hurricane Ida relief through the UCC. Neighbors in Need offering will be received on World Communion Sunday, and for a couple of Sundays beyond that.


Deacons: Deacons will be handing out dinner rolls on World Communion Sunday. Jonna Jensen will be preaching via zoon on October 10, Petra will be conducting rest of the service in the sanctuary. Petra is working on preparing a pre-recorded service, should she be called away quickly to be with her mother. Patrick and four choir members will be working on recording a service of Christmas music to be used on December 26.

Pastor: She will be preparing ahead two Sundays of recording services. She asked whether any of us had suggestions for the room which used to be the nursery. She attended the installation of new pastor at the Westbrook Warren church. On October 23, in person, the workshop portion of the Maine Conference of the UCC will be held. On November 6, via zoom, the business portion of the meeting will be held.

Audio/visual and Covid discussions: Rolf let us know that there is still an audio problem with recording. The audio is not passing through the mixer, it is going right to You tube. We need to do mock run throughs to try and figure this out. Would be good to do this before the service on October 10 with our Transitional Conference Minister Jonna Jensen. There have been no changes from the CDC recently regarding Covid requirements. We seem to be in good shape for now with the precautions which we are currently taking.

Old Business: there was no additional old business to address.

New Business: Tom asked the group if we wanted to consider doing something for Halloween. Nothing has come out from the town at this point regarding Halloween. Any decisions made could be last minute. We will keep thinking about this. Tom asked if we wanted to do the Christmas cookie sale which Lynn Gagne organized last year. It was very successful last year, and something done easily in spite of Covid. Tom will talk to Lynn. No final decision, but will probably go back to zoom starting the first Sunday of January. This is something that Michael will be able to do from home. Will continue through mid to late March, possibly return to in person on first day of spring. Weathervane deadline for September is Friday, September 24. Next meeting will be Wednesday, October 20, at 6:00 PM, via zoom. Meeting was adjourned at 7:05 PM.
