From the Pastor ...

During this season of Advent, my sister-in-law Cindy is challenging herself to memorize the Magnificat from Luke1:46-55

We don't usually talk about Mary that much but upon further research I discovered that this song was the longest set of words spoken by a woman in the New Testament (and a poor, young, unmarried woman at that!). Traditionally we think of Mary as meek and scared but when singing this song, she comes across as a rebel who according to Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a German pastor and theologian who was executed by the Nazis, the Magnificat "the most passionate, the wildest, one might even say the most revolutionary hymn ever sung."

Theologian Warren Carter writes that in the time of Jesus, two or three percent of the population was rich, while the majority lived in poverty: "...*Mary speaks of a time when all will enjoy the good things given by God.*" Perhaps you feel compelled to learn the Magnificat by heart during this Advent season as we anticipate the birth of Jesus.

Summary of Wednesday, November 10, 2021 Coordinating Council/Deacons Meeting

A joint meeting of the coordinating council and deacons was called to order via zoom by Tom Wiley on Wednesday, November 10, 2021, at 6:00PM. Present were Tom, Caryl, Brenda, Nancy, Rolf, Petra, Deb, and Judy.

Caryl offered the opening prayer.

Tom reviewed the agenda and set end time of 7:00 PM.

Treasurer's Report: Brenda reminded us that we had agreed to have formal treasurer report, only quarterly, not each month. She did report, however, that we had received reimbursement for the cost of the ramp in the sanctuary. She also reported that excess expenses for the month were \$2,661, better than budget of -\$3,189. She is starting work on the budget, will have a draft for our December meeting.

Reports of the Coordinator:

Clerk: nothing to report

Trustees: Rolf reported that the furnaces in the church and the parsonage had been cleaned recently. There was a lot more work than expected done in the church, but it should now run more efficiently. He is waiting for the scouts to clean up leaves. Thanks to Brenda and Caryl for cleaning out the furnace room.

Missions: Caryl reported that during the month of November, we will be collecting items for ditty bags for Seafarers. Polly has prepared greeting cards to go in the bags. We will be donating Hannaford gift cards to families identified by social worker in Raymond schools who could use help to put Thanksgiving dinner on the table. We have also ordered gift cards for use by food pantry for purchase of turkeys to be given out to their clients. The food pantry will reimburse us for these, so both pantry and church will benefit from discount that we receive. In December, we will be collecting items for Maine Seacoast Mission wish list. We will also be donating Walmart gift cards to parents of Raymond school kids who need help with Christmas gifts. Caryl also reported that she continues to be our representative on the Fuller Foundation board. They are working on three houses in the area this fall.

Christian Education: nothing to report

Stewardship: Stewardship letters have been sent out. Stewardship is this Sunday, the 14th.

Deacons: Caryl reported that schedule has been finalized through December. The first Sunday in

December will be a lay service, led by the Deacons, since Petra will be away. Communion will be a week late.

Pastor: Petra reported concerns about cleaning of kitchen and vestry. We have two back to back events on November 20 and 21. Rolf reported that normally, after a rental of that space, he would leave a message for his cleaners to pay special attention to that space, so they could wash floor etc. Council and Deacons agreed that in this case, we would pay special attention to how the space looked after coffee hour on the 21st. There was additional discussion on how best to use the cleaning time which we have budgeted for. Rolf also pointed out that normally a renter is responsible for clean up, and that if we need someone to go in for cleaning, there would be an extra charge.

Old Business:

Audio Visual: Rolf reported that he had spoken to Sweetwater. The equipment which he had originally been looking at, is not in stock. He and Will have agreed on other equipment, 2 microphones and 2 receivers, which are in stock, and should be ordered and shipped soon.

Cookie Sale: Lynn has agreed to go ahead with Christmas cookie sale. Orders need to be received by 12/14, pick up will be on 12/18. Orders can be emailed to the office. Tom will take care of publicity.

Annual Meeting will be held via zoom on January 23, 2022. Judy was reminded that the Warrant needs to be in the upcoming Weathervane since we do not print a Weathervane the end of December. The Warrant will also be read on zoom worship for the 2 weeks prior.

New Business: Zoom Worship will begin on January 2, 2022. The Deacon of the day will announce topic for conversation after service is finished. Caryl had sent a link to all of us listing possible topics. As we had previously discussed, we hope to have a Saturday social event for the months that we will not be in person. The first will be a pot luck brunch on January 15, at 11 AM.

Our next meeting will be Tuesday, December 14, at 4;30 PM, via zoom. The meeting was adjourned at 7:10 PM.

Who owns the pews in the sanctuary?

"The church, of course." would be Caryl's answer and that is our goal by end of 2021.

Yet there is history that needs consideration on two fronts:

- 1. The people who paid to have the pews installed and had deeds for those pews recorded at the Cumberland County Registry of Deeds
- 2. The people who have been sitting in the same pew for years, as have their ancestors

Ernie Knights wrote a pamphlet called "Raymond Village Church, the first hundred years: 1879-1979". On page 14 he explains that the following people purchased specified pews:

Owner	Pews owned (by number)
Joseph Tukey	2., 25, and ½ of 18
Gibeon Davis	5 and 19
Erastus Plummer	6, 21 and ½ of 28
David Plummer Jr	7 and 8
William H Smith	9
John Mussey	10
Henry Harmon	16
Orrin Chipman	18
Thomas Morton	27
Annie W Leach	31
Margaret Leach	37

We have since learned there were other pews sold that are not listed above such as one by Al and Charlotte Rowe and others by family of Dave and Kim Allen

There were other pews that were not purchased / paid for / registered, yet family members sat in the same pew for years – a great tradition.

Our sanctuary has undergone changes over the years, yet most of the pews have remained. Now, as we aim to make the church more accessible, pews had to be removed to make way for a ramp from the sanctuary to the office level with restrooms. This raised the question "What do we do with the pews that have been removed?"

We are taking this opportunity to ask anyone who has an ownership interest (as described above) in one or more pews to step forward and tell us what you want to do

- Return ownership of the pew(s) to the church, OR
- Remove your pew (which may be in pieces if removed to make room for the ramp...it can be reassembled)

December Mission – Christmas Fund
