My sister-in-law Cindy sent me the book "Surprise the World" written by Michael Frost. Cindy has overcome many challenges in her life and told me that this book revolutionized her faith journey in the last three years. Needless to say, I was intrigued.

The book outlines five things that can cause Christians to live surprising and "questionable" lives. "Questionable" means that your life is so amazing that other people want to know why you do the things you do, and the answer is because of your faith.

Michael Frost writes that we can share our faith in surprisingly simple ways:

We BLESS people, both inside and outside the church.

We EAT together, sharing meals with believers and nonbelievers alike.

We LISTEN to the guidance and direction of the Holy Spirit as we engage with those around us.

We LEARN Christ as our leader and model for making disciples.

We see ourselves SENT by God to everywhere life takes us.

Cindy is currently not driving, so she took a bus to get to an appointment. She exchanged friendly greetings with the bus driver, who helped her into the bus. Cindy felt compelled to hand the driver a gift card to a local coffee shop at the end of her ride. At first, the driver...her name is Latoya... declined the gift, but Cindy insisted.

The next thing she knew, Latoya was weeping. Through tears, she told Cindy that her husband and seven-month-old child had been in an accident a few hours earlier. Her spouse let her know that they were OK and that she should continue on with her day at work. Both ladies had a good conversation about the coincidence that Cindy surprised Latoya with a very small gift... only enough for a coffee and a pastry... on a day when she really needed support. Both were blessed by the conversation.

Indeed, we need to remember that all of us are a blessing, so let us go out into the world and be a blessing.

Lent and Holy Week Worship

We are in the midst of Lent now and, before we know it, Holy Week will begin. Here is an overview of our special worship plans for Lent and Holy Week:

Palm Sunday on April 10th at 10:00 a.m. - We will celebrate Jesus's triumphal entry into Jerusalem with palms and with traditional music played by Michael!

Maundy Thursday, April 14th at 5:30 p.m. – We will worship in the sanctuary. At the Last Supper, Jesus commanded that people should love one another. To celebrate Maundy Thursday, we will tell the story of the days leading up to and of Jesus crucifixion and join in communion together.

Good Friday, April 15th - The sanctuary will be open from Noon until 3:00 p.m. for anyone who wants to come in. Petra or a Deacon will be on duty. The readings about the Holy week story will be available.

Easter Sunday, April 17th

- We are invited to join the Casco Village Church for a sunrise worship at 6:30 a.m. at the church. (No breakfast will be served)
- **RVCC** worship at 10:00 a.m. will be a joyous event. **He is Risen**! The service will be full of music from begin to end. Two of Michael's school mates, Angel Ortiz (soprano) and Cat Sullivan (alto) will sing special music accompanied by Michael. **We invite everyone to bring flowers to put on display at the altar**. Summary of March 16, 2022 Coordinating Council/Deacons Meeting

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Tom Wiley, moderator. Present were Tom, Rolf, Brenda, Petra, Caryl, Nancy, Deb, and Judy.

Nancy offered the opening prayer.

Agenda was reviewed, end time of 8:30 p.m. was set.

Financial Report: Brenda gave a brief summary of February financial statement. \$1600 received from the previous year pledge has bumped up income. We have had some high price fuel deliveries, no surprise there. She will try not to get another oil delivery while prices are so high. We are paying insurance bills monthly now, not quarterly. She has asked the insurance company to reduce the value of the thrift shop building down to \$0. Brenda reported that due to the current volatile market, she has not made the changes which she proposed to our American Funds. Recently she had to make a withdrawal for cash flow purposes, but is not taking any more than she needs for the short term. The market will undoubtedly continue to go up and down.

Clerk: nothing to report

Trustees: Rolf reported that he has had to change cleaning companies. In the long run, he expects the cost to be about the same as we have been paying. He has not yet replaced the hot water tank. As long as we are still running the oil burner for heating purposes, he can still use the hot water off of that.

Missions: Caryl reported that during the month of March we are focusing on financial help for Ukraine, and on One Great Hour of Sharing.

Christian Education: Petra reported that the Lenten book study is going well, there are 6 people enrolled. They are meeting on Wednesday evenings.

Stewardship: Craig has requested to join us at our next meeting to talk about pot roast suppers.

Deacons: Caryl announced that the deacons had met the night before with a packed agenda. Plans were discussed for back to worship on March 27. Will, Deb, and Rolf have had a dress rehearsal with new equipment and feel all is ready for recording. Spring flowers will be in the church, lots of music. We will light a "peace candle for Ukraine" each Sunday. There will be a coffee hour. For Palm Sunday, Nancy to order Palms, again lots of traditional music. Plans were discussed for Maundy Thursday, service will be in dim light, there will be a number of readings. The church will be open as usual on Good Friday from noon until 3 p.m., with quiet music. Petra, Caryl, and Nancy will be there for an

hour each. Petra has spoken with Joyce at the Casco church about doing the Hunger Walk, one way. For Easter, on April 17, again lots of special music with Michael and two friends of his from school, an alto and soprano. We will end with the Hallelujah chorus, again with soloists and congregation. Easter flowers will not be ordered, but people are encouraged to bring in cut flowers or flowering plants to decorate the church. There will be a list in the bulletin of those who are remembered by the flowers, contact Lori at the church office to leave names. Caryl announced information about service of remembrance for Adma. Petra added that there will be an Easter Sunrise Service in the parking lot at the Casco church, there will be no breakfast. Petra will be away on April 24, Rev. Joanne Painter will preach. Caryl announced that she needs someone to tape the service on April 10, none of the deacons are available.

Moderator: Tom had nothing to report.

Old Business: Rolf and Deb reported that all went well in checking out equipment in the church for recording. Tom thanked Brenda, Rolf, and Craig for taking on the Saturday socials for the past three months. They were a great success.

New Business: Preparations are being made for back to in-person worship. Cleaning is being done, masks and hand sanitizer will be available. After discussion, however, it was decided that, for now, people should do what they feel comfortable with, but masks will not be required. We will revisit this before Easter. Weathervane will probably be printed on March 29, our next meeting will be on Thursday, April 7 at 6:30 p.m., Deacons will meet on Tuesday, April 5 at 5:30 p.m.


