Strive to be happy.



#### Summary of April 7, 2022 Coordinating Council/Deacons Meeting

The meeting was called to order by Tom Wiley, Moderator, at 6:30 PM, on April 7, 2022. Present were Tom, Petra, Rolf, Caryl, Deb, Brenda, Judy, and Craig Messenger.

Tom offered the opening prayer.

The agenda was reviewed, end time of 7:30 was set.

Craig had joined the meeting to talk about the upcoming supper season. He suggests the 2<sup>nd</sup> Saturday of each month, starting in May. It was agreed to stick with drive in version, which has worked well for the past two years. An increase in price was suggested, but others felt we should keep it the same as last year. We want to keep people coming. Craig had met with new owner at local butcher shop, and feels we will be able to keep expenses at last years level. It was agreed to start the second Saturday in May. Tom will work on updating flier and getting it in the upcoming all church emails, as well as the Weathervane. Rolf suggested that we announce cut off time of noon for ordering meals for that evening. No orders will be accepted after that time.

Treasurer's Report: Brenda presented the financials for the first quarter of 2022. Brenda is keeping her eye on a couple of things. She is hoping not to have to need an oil delivery before the price goes down. She is also watching American Funds. She has sold one, but is keeping an eye on two others, waiting for them to come back up before she needs to sell them. Total income of \$18,575.33 was slightly over budget for the quarter. Total expenses were also over budget for the quarter. Current quarter net excess expense of \$9,007 was worse than the budgeted excess expense of \$7,729(includes \$2,853 in American Funds stock decrease). Brenda also reported that we have received donations in memory of Adma. It was suggested that we let Adma's daughter know about what comes in. We also need to thank people for those donations.

**Clerk:** nothing to report

**Trustees:** Rolf is planning on replacing the hot water heater in time to put it in the dumpster which is coming for clean out and demo of the thrift shop. Craig will help him with the hot water heater.

**Missions:** We continue to collect for Ukraine. Judy announced that Church World Service has announced collection date for hygiene and school kits for early May. Bags and a list attached are available for collecting supplies for hygiene kits. We have the supplies for school kits, and

Sarah Allen has made the bags for them. They just need to be assembled.

**Christian Education:** Last session of the Lenten book study will be next week. It has gone well.

**Stewardship:** Brenda will work on a quarterly pledge letter after Easter.

**Deacons:** They met on Tuesday, all is set for Holy Week.

Moderator: Tom had nothing to report.

**Pastor:** Petra reminded us of Sunrise Service on Easter in Casco. There will not be a breakfast. Petra will probably be taking another week of vacation in May, depending on her mother's needs.

Old Business: Rolf announced that fill the dumpster day with what remains in the thrift shop will be Saturday April 23. Demo of the building will be shortly after that. Propane tank in the area has been removed. There was discussion of whether we need any change at this time in our Covid policies. It was decided not to make any changes. We will continue to revisit this issue at least monthly.

New Business: Rachel has requested use of the vestry for line dancing on Thursdays and Fridays beginning in early June. The council approved her request. Petra announced that Chan Roach, Deb Feagans, Alice Oldford, and Caryl Gilman have agreed to read the book "Holy Conversations", and participate in discussion to follow. Weathervane will probably be printed on April 28, deadline for submitting will be the weekend prior.

Our next meeting will be Monday, May 9, at 6:30 PM, via zoom. The deacons are going back to meeting in person.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:25 PM.

We are moving toward the final phase of removing the thrift shop so we can do reshaping of the driveway and add some additional parking. The final task before the demolitions was to clean out the long years of; paraphernalia, matter, detritus, scrap, long forgotten items or what ever colloquial term you wish to tie to the years of accumulated goods.



## May Mission Opportunity – supporting Sebago Lakes Region Fuller Center for Housing Project = Linda and John G

RVCC is a founding member of Sebago Lakes Region Fuller Center for Housing (SLRFC). As a reminder, SLRFC provides home repairs for aging adults and veterans enabling them to stay in their homes safely. This faith-based organization started in 2019 with six founding member church/organizations in the communities of Raymond, Standish, and Windham, Maine.

Despite the ongoing impact of Covid-19, SLRFC helped 14 families in the Sebago Lakes Region during 2020 & 2021. These projects involved 60 volunteers working over 470 hours. SLRFC has replaced leaking entry doors, repaired siding and painted a garage, repaired rotted windows, done fall clean-ups, bulky waste removal, installed a storm door, installed a new walkway for a safer entrance, and partnered with a local roofing contractor to have a new roof installed for a local veteran in Raymond.

The largest project to date involves helping a couple struggling with advanced ALS. John G is completely physically disabled and lives 24/7 in a wheelchair. He is nonverbal, but communicates through a computer tablet. His wife, Linda, is his full-time caretaker. Getting outside is a lengthy and painful process, involving multiple maneuvers and a wheelchair lift in the garage. Because it is hard for him to be moved, he does not leave the house at all except for necessary appointments. Even worse, the house does not have a second exit that he can access, and he would be in grave danger

in the event of a fire or other emergency.




The goal is to build a second exit from the home so that in the event of a fire John could be quickly removed from the house; and to build an attached deck and ramp so that John and Linda could safely get outside to enjoy the fresh air and sunshine.

This project involves months of design, planning, budgeting, support from suppliers, contractors, volunteers, and significant fundraising. SLRFC plans to complete the project in August 2022. SLRFC will commit \$5,000 of the projected \$45,000 cost from our Sebago Fuller Housing funds, as well as all volunteer hours to manage the project, fund-raise, and get community volunteers to help on work days. One project day, July 29th, will involve part of a 35-member Fuller Center bike adventure tour group as they finish a cross country ride from Oregon to Sebago Lake, Maine, Other organizations partnering on this effort include our founding churches, St. Josephs College, and

PowerServe, a local community service group involving high school students and community leaders.

We at RVCC have a chance to contribute to a life changing solution for John and Linda. An ADA approved doorway is a key element. The estimated cost for the door (without installation) is \$2,000. We are asking the congregation to contribute to the purchase of the ADA door and RVCC Mission Fund will match your contributions. We plan to cut a check for this project in mid-June.
