# From the Pastor ...

It is good to be back with all of you. After being gone for two months, it feels wonderfully familiar and comforting to be back at church.

As many of you know, I went to Germany to pick up my Mom from the hospital and bring her home. The hospital set her up with a palliative team, who came to care for her three times a week.

A few weeks ago, during the worship service, I shared with you my conversation on the morning of Mom's death. My brother and I had been sitting at her bedside, sharing stories and looking at picture albums when Mischa and I were in elementary school. We laughed and had moments of silence as we looked at the pictures. We also recalled memories of how we, as a family, played tennis for many years. Both my brother and my Mom are dog lovers. When we were growing up, we had a border collie. His name was Rascal, and he lived for 14 years. There were lots of family pictures with Rascal. My Mom had shared if she could live her life over again, she would have a hundred dogs. She loved looking at the pictures, and so did we.

After one and a half hours of reminiscing, we could tell that our Mom was exhausted. It was 10:30 am, and the palliative team was due at 11:00 am. I asked my Mom if she wanted to sleep until the nurse came, and she agreed. I told her that I would check in on her in five minutes to make sure she was okay, and she looked at me and said: "Thank you."

Those were the last words she spoke. I shared with some of you a couple weeks ago the words from Meister Eckart: "If the only prayer you ever say in your entire life is thank you, it will be enough."

Since her death, I have had time to reflect on what she meant when she said: "Thank you." Initially, I thought my Mom's thank you was about coming back to check on her.

On a bigger scale, I now believe her "thank you" was also for you. You, as a congregation, supported my Mom and me as her illness progressed. It meant a lot to my Mom that I could come and take care of her. She knew that you supported us whole heartily.

## Seafarer's Friend - mid-October through mid-November

The mission at Seafarer's Friend is to extend the ministry of the churches to meet the unmet spiritual, social and practical needs of seafarers in the New England Maritime Community. # Summary of Monday, October 10, 2022 Coordinating Council/Deacons Meeting

The meeting was called to order at 4:00 PM on Monday, October 10, 2022 by Tom Wiley. Present were Tom, Rolf, Brenda, Petra, Nancy, Deb, Caryl, and Judy. Bonnie Wiley, Chair of the Pastoral Relations Committee also joined us.

Judy offered the opening prayer.

Tom reviewed the agenda and set a closing time.

Treasurer: Brenda presented the financial statement for the third quarter. Total income of \$13,267 was under budget by \$5,939 for the quarter. This includes the loss of \$1924 in the American Funds. Total income for the year to date is \$46,158, under budget by \$10,610. This included the loss of \$10,204 in the American Funds. Expenses were under budget by \$1097 year to date. Year to date net expense of \$26,316 is worse than budgeted net expense of \$16,803. Most of our financial losses are due to losses in American Funds.

## Reports of the Coordinators:

Clerk: nothing to report

**Trustees:** Rolf reported that he has taken down the tarp over the patio, now he can pressure wash that side of the building. Our cleaning company will not be able to keep us as a customer, we need to find a new one. He will contact the scouts for outside clean up, raking etc. He has recently gotten oil for the church as well as k-1 for the parsonage.

Missions: Caryl reported that we are finishing up collecting for Neighbors in Need, and are also collecting for hurricane relief. She has started collecting for ditty bag project for Maine Seafarers. Before Christmas we will be collecting for Maine Seacoast Mission Wish List. She is not going to collect and send needed items this year. People can go directly to Amazon and select from their list of wanted items or write a check to the church and Caryl will purchase gift cards. Judy is starting to work with the local schools to donate Hannaford cards to those who need help for Thanksgiving. Before Christmas we will give them Walmart gift cards for those who need help in giving their kids a nice Christmas. We will also give the Raymond Food Pantry gift cards for the director to give to those who he feels need a little more help than what they get from the pantry twice a month.

Christian Education: nothing to report

**Stewardship:** Rolf reported that Craig would like to meet with us, probably at our next meeting to discuss thoughts about pot roast suppers for next spring/summer. Rolf reported that they have one roast in the freezer left over from this years suppers, Craig would like to put on a meal

this fall to thank all who volunteered for the suppers this year. There was discussion about Stewardship Sunday, it will be November 13. Stewardship letter, written by Brenda, will go out by the end of October. Theme on pledge card will be "Now is the Time".

**Deacons:** Caryl reported that the Deacons will meet on Tuesday, October 11. On their agenda will be: will we go on line at all this winter, how will we do communion going forward, also plans for advent and Christmas Eve. Christmas Day is on Sunday, this year.

Moderator: Tom brought up question of allowing Rachel to have line dancing, once a week, through the winter months. No one had a problem with this. An antique desk had been left at the church, we will search out antique dealers. Concerning the Security Workshop which Tom had sent out information on, it was agreed that it probably was not applicable to our church, and was not something that we would be able to follow through on even if someone did attend.

**Pastor:** Petra thanked us all for our support over the past couple of months. She is happy to be back. Caryl announced that the Maine Conference Annual Meeting will be held on the morning of October 15. She will attend via zoom.

**Old Business:** There was no old business.

### **New Business:**

Halloween: It was agreed to open the church again this year for Halloween. Judy and Deb agreed to run the event. Judy will get out the word that we need candy, if we don't get enough, Missions will buy more. Rolf will check on road closure times with the town.

**Covid:** Currently numbers seem to be trending up, although Cumberland County is still considered low. We will continue to have masks available for those who feel they need to wear one. There is room to spread out. Decisions on worship other than in person, would be made by the Deacons.

Congregational Meetings: There was discussion on the group discussion that Rev. Jonna led after worship on October 2. We need to be able to do more planning for our future, and we need outside leadership for this. Moving on to Change in Pastoral Hours/Units, there was discussion on whether we can reduce Petra's hours to give her the time she needs to settle her parents estate, as well as free up funds for outside leadership. Caryl Gilman made a motion that at this time, we remove 2 units from Petra's workload with the opportunity to add it back. The motion was seconded by Rolf, and passed.

# 2022 Maine Conference Annual Meeting - the 91st!

Theme: "Where the River flows, Life will Flourish"

The Maine Conference Annual Meeting was Saturday October 15 via Zoom. The business agenda was embedded in the worship. The key business elements can be found in the <u>order of worship</u>:

- 2023 Conference Budget/Vote,
- Resolution of support for Tribal Sovereignty in Maine,
- vote on new members to the Maine Conference Board of Directors.

The words, prayers, sounds (flowing water), music, pictures - (streams, Pilgrim Lodge, and many speakers whose message was pre-recorded outside) - all were uplifting! It was a pleasure to attend as a voting member from RVCC! Here are a few of the things I learned during the meeting:

- At least 2/3 of our congregations are served by part-time ministry.
- One church in Waterville had to choose building or program. After much discussion they chose mission over maintenance. They sold their building and now focus on helping others directly or providing funds to other organizations. Their most recent project is Stone Soup café.
- Winthrop UCC is a small yet vital church. They are smaller since the pandemic down 53 to 35. They are tired with "aching joints" At the same time they have been talking about what it means to live out their calling. They have hosted 2 MESOM interns and have done joint Zoom worship services with other churches. They have 4 people who handle the technology. When the music leader is absent, congregants lead music. They are in talks with another church who is selling their building and could come rent space at Winthrop UCC
- Another church with 2 part-time pastors, who alternate Sundays, tried an experiment during one pastor's sabbatical. They held an open pulpit, inviting congregants to share their "good news". Now that the pastor is back, they will continue this practice as all found it fulfilling.
- Osihkiyol (Zeke) Crofton-Macdonald, provided a history of the Wabanaki and the journey propose a resolution, agreed to by the churches at Annual Meeting. A resolution is a tool to remind us of what we agreed upon with the purpose of supporting restorative justice= tribal sovereignty. Zeke is of the Wolastoqey Nation, Tribal Ambassador for the Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians and Maine Indian Tribal State Commission, Tribal Co-Commissioner, The recording can be found here: <a href="https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ZU\_3D2AeMjU">https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ZU\_3D2AeMjU</a>
