Changing World, or is it?

My years of University and Seminary provided an interesting reality check into the world. One which is not so easily understood for most people as we do not all have this opportunity to engage in these places in our forties. And it was not because of academics or schools, per say. It was because of the communities. The peers I studied with revealed so much about the way our world has changed. I mention this truth as one of the most rudimentary questions I thought would ever be asked was: "at what age are we considered adults in the United States."

For me, the question seemed simple, eighteen as that is the year we are responsible for ourselves. Oddly enough, that was not the answer many of the students provided. They said everything from 21 to 35, though I never did get that last one. In general, the feeling was that you could not define an age when everyone had to be classified as an adult because we are all different. Although I agree that we are all different and I personally am not a big fan of classifications, I must think that we need a societal norm stating when people are truly adults. When are people responsible for themselves and their choices in life? When were you responsible for your choices; for what you did to the Body of Christ; for finding the community which encouraged your faith?

I always thought it was odd that in the Roman Catholic faith, youth at around the age of thirteen were considered adults upon completion of their Confirmation. I thought it was odd until – well, until I had that encounter with a group of students from the younger generation. At the same time as I was introduced to this adulthood question, I was engaged with other individuals who came to church on Sunday; but other than that, took no responsibility for engaging in their own faith. They did not come to Bible study, or prayer group, or Mission projects. Rather they just flowed along in *Continued next page . . .*

their habit but no real ownership of their faith. It was a very interesting dichotomy. Or was it?

The truth of the matter that I learned from this time is that very few people wish to take responsibility, especially for things such as faith. It takes work to be engaged, to share your thoughts, to define your future. It takes work – good faithful work, but work, none the less. And some of us are just tired.

Tired from pulling the stone of the church uphill (both ways – through the snow – no sarcasm included) by such a small group of people. Oof, why would you not be tired? Our church structures were built with 40 or 50 active people all taking turns in mind, not ten who are doing everything.

The reality is that a merger is a good solution to our current problem; but it is still only a short-term solution. For the long term, we in the Christian faith are going to have to take responsibility for our faith. Find the ways that engage us personally. Develop our own Spiritual Gifts and yes change with the times. For, people today whether we are 13 or 93 do not find as much encouragement in the meetings and Bible Studies, generally speaking. There are vast exceptions. People today want to engage their faith. Yes, even we here are engaging our faith in Pot Roast dinners, in knitting groups, in coffee hour discussions about our personal lives. These are the ways we show up in community along with worship.

So maybe, we need to take personal responsibility for our faith and create something new based on who we are individually rather than just keep trying to engage in a structure of faith which has not changed in the last fifty years. Maybe we need to recognize the world is changing and we need to change with it as well.

Prayer: God in this season of Pentecost, re-create us as we truly are – your faithful community of worship. Faithfully and responsibly loving You. *Amen.*

Summary of Tuesday, May 14, 2024 Council/Deacons Meeting

Tom called the meeting to order at 5:00 PM on Tuesday, May14, 2024, in person. Present were Tom, Brenda, Rolf, Caryl, Judy, Deb, and Brian

Tom offered the opening prayer "Times of Transition". The agenda was reviewed.

Treasurer's Report: Brenda reported that Financial Statement continues to look good. Brenda and Caryl reported that we are giving scholarships for Pilgrim Lodge to two young people.

Pastor: Brian reported that the family of Betty Shively would like to do a memorial service for her at RVCC. Brian will joined by Rev. Amelia Nugent-Edson from the Falmouth church in leading the service. No date has been set.

Clerk: nothing to report

Deacons: Deacons will purchase geraniums for Pentecost. People are encouraged to wear red. Since we were not together at RVCC on Mothers Day, we will celebrate all parents on Fathers Day.

Missions: Judy reported that we are in the process of collecting for Strengthen the Church. She also reported that as a congregation we put together 21 Hygiene Kits and 12 School Kits. Thanks to all who contributed to these.

Stewardship: Brenda reported that she is working on the Stewardship Letter, it will go out next week.

Trustees: Rolf reported that with help from the Lions, our driveway has been leveled out, and our gardens in the front of the church have been weeded. The Boy Scouts have also been doing some clean up outside the building. He is still trying to schedule the repair on the steeple. The canopy over the patio will go up, after he spray washes that side of the building.

Old Business: Plans for the first pot roast supper were reviewed. Brenda will do publicity. The Deacons will host a send off for Michael at the end of the summer.

New Business: Brian asked for feedback from those who attended either Gray or Casco churches on May 12. The number attending each church on that Sunday from RVCC was fairly equal. Judy, Deb, and Tom provided feedback on accessibility for Polly at the Gray church. Other feedback on each church was also provided. Both churches had a lay lead service on that day. Brian brought up a concern of his that our church may be split on which church to merge with. He is feeling that we may be looking at a dissolution of our church, rather than a merger. After much discussion, it was agreed that we need to have another conversational meeting with our congregation about this issue. It was agreed to hold the meeting after church on June 23. Lunch will be served. It was agreed that this will be an informal meeting, there does not need to be a warrant. In the meantime, the merger processes will continue.

Council members were informed about the Memory Project. Brian, Alice Oldfords, Judy, Deb, Craig, and Caryl are working on this. Photos of church events, both old and new are being gathered, starting May 26th, these will be displayed at coffee hour, and committee members will be available to record feedback from people as they look at the photos. Goal is to put together scrapbook of the history of our church to be available for everyone.
